Sacraments

Baptism: Parents wishing to have their child baptized are asked to call the Parish Office to schedule a preparation session and the tentative date.

Matrimony: Couples planning to enter into Holy Matrimony are to call the office at least one year prior to set a tentative date and schedule Pre-Cana.

Reconciliation: Please consult the bulletin for dates and times or call one of our priests for an appointment.

Hospital and Homebound: Please call the office for First Friday or Anointing.

Priesthood and Religious Life: Contact our priests for an appointment.

The sacrifice is gathered and now being offered. Just as the Opening Prayer collects all our prayers into one prayer of the Church, the Preface does the same but much more. At this point in the Holy Mass we bring together the Sacrifice of Jesus on the Cross, the sacrifice we bring to this Holy Mass, and the Sacrifice of the Lamb at the end time. Thus, we enter into eternity as we unite ourselves in both time and place as the entire Church (Militant, Triumphant, and Suffering) gathering at one Holy Mass. All time and place is thus brought together before the Cross of Christ and offered with Christ to the Father. We are not offering Christ Crucified again and again; rather, we are uniting ourselves to that one sacrifice and thus fulfilling Sacred Scripture:

"Not that he might offer himself repeatedly, as the high priest enters each year into the sanctuary with blood that is not his own; if that were so, he would have had to suffer repeatedly from the foundation of the world. But now once for all he has appeared at the end of the ages to take away sin by his sacrifice." (Hebrews 9:25-26)

Thus, we unite ourselves to Christ's sacrifice and the fullness of worship at the end time whenever we pray the Holy Mass.

We then pray with all the angels and saints the Sanctus, the Holy. We begin

with the vision of Isaiah echoed in Revelation, "Holy, holy holy is the Lord of hosts! All the earth is filled with his glory," (Isaiah 6:3) We then unite ourselves to the triumphal entry into Jerusalem with cries of "Hosanna in the highest." We then pray with David and Jesus Psalm 118:26 "Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord." This psalm is Jesus' lament over Jerusalem, after the triumphal entry, where He longs for their love and unity with God. We then console Jesus as we offer another Hosanna and our willingness to unite our sacrifice to His, "filling up what is lacking in the afflictions of Christ." (Col 1:24) How awesome is God's eternal love. God's Peace! Fr. Brian





Soup, Salad and Study for the Soul


